


# METHODOLOGY









Being able to provide for their child is also at the top of the list, followed by a number of personal readiness factors.


Financial factors tend to be found further down the list in terms of importance, though many are still seen as significant by wide margins.







Perceived barriers to have children largely revolve around *finances* – 7 of the top 10 barriers relate to *finances*.


Personal readiness factors continue to be reported among the biggest factors.


Do you believe you have quality and effective medical care near where you live?





Would you be more likely to have children if your employer provided paid parental leave?






# FREE HEALTHCARE DURING/AFTER PREGNANCY

Would you be more likely to have children if you had free healthcare during pregnancy and 12 months postpartum?












